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Overall, students "enjoyed connecting with students around the world" and appreciated the intercultural exchange facilitated by the collaboration with Bielefeld.

Voices

First step exposure of students to studying abroad with fostering of interest for future inperson and/or longer duration study abroad opportunities

Potential of life-long friendships and connections of participating students

Several noted the need for trust in learning teams and ensuring psychological safety where non-English speakers were hesitant to express views because of perceived limitations of vocabulary. Canadian students also discussed their new discovery that they speak quickly and realized the need to ensure understanding by others.

Students clearly appreciated having different instructors who brought different perspectives to the course material. Most of all, Canadian students appreciated the opportunity to collaborate with German students in carrying out various class activities and their microteaching project.

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Truly authentic experience working with someone from a different country. I have been telling everybody about this course.

I liked working with both the Canadian students and German students together as a group. We had a very good time and it was a very interesting experience. I also liked the Canadian perspective to the tasks/topics




