MA Sociology at Bielefeld University Study in a uniquely interdisciplinary environment

Bielefeld University's Faculty of Sociology holds a unique position in Germany: it is the only autonomous faculty of sociology in the country. It is also one of the largest academic institutions of sociology in Europe. The Faculty regularly receives top places in the rankings for its broad range of courses and its exceptional research on current sociological issues. These include social structures and social inequality, organizations, labour and markets, mass media, science and technology, gender issues, transnational relations and migration, and the world society. The Faculty also hosts the Collaborative Research Centre on "From Heterogeneities to Social Inequalities" and the Institute for World Society Studies.

Course Programme

The MA Sociology International Track is a globally oriented study programme for both international and domestic students. Its specially tailored academic programme qualifies students for an international career in academia, public institutions, non-governmental organizations, and private companies in Germany, Europe, or anywhere else in the world.

- Sociology of the Global World (regular)
- Sociology Theory (irregular)
- Sociological Methods (irregular)
- Sociology of Work and Economics (irregular)
- Political Sociology (irregular)
- Organizational Sociology (irregular)
- Sociology of Gender (irregular)
- Sociology of Science and Technology (irregular)
- Media Sociology (irregular)

Irregular courses, unlike regular courses, are not offered every single year.

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The course programme consists of three elements:

Study element	Semester
Introductory module (lectures in theory and methods)	1–2
Six elective modules (Twelve courses)	1–3
Conclusion module (master thesis)	4

The programme offers every student the opportunity to carry out empirical work in a student research project. They are free to choose their own topics within the framework of one of their elective modules. In addition, students can take academic language training courses in English, German, and other languages. They are also encouraged to integrate one or two semesters abroad into their study programme – the Faculty of Sociology cooperates with numerous partner universities and has more than 50 bilateral agreements within the ERASMUS/Socrates exchange programme.

Admission requirements and application

Students must have a BA degree in Sociology or a related discipline acquired in a study programme lasting at least 3 years. Students with other academic backgrounds may apply for admission, and those with well-founded cases will be accepted. Further requirements are a diploma certificate and a transcript of courses.

Students must provide proof that their current English language proficiency meets the International Track's minimum entry requirements. This can be a TOEFL (iBT) with a minimum of 87 points, telc English with a minimum grade of B2, or equivalent English-language tests. A study qualification or study degree received at an English-language institution is also sufficient proof of English proficiency.

Although students can commence the programme in either the winter (October) or the summer semester (April), the course schedule is geared to a winter start. A summer start could delay the course of your studies.

Services and Support for International Students

In addition to the many services and facilities available to all students, the International Office offers a wide range of specially tailored services to help you adjust to your new surroundings and take full advantage of your studies. In addition to a wide-ranging leisure-time programme, Bielefeld University provides the Brother-Sister programme: a personal tutoring programme for all first-year international students in which student mentors look after international students who are new to Bielefeld and help them to get everything organized and handle any necessary bureaucracy during their first semester.

The International Office also hosts an accommodation agency. This can give you advice on renting student apartments in Germany and it is a source of information from people with apartments to let.

Fees and costs

In spring 2011 the government of North-Rhine Westphalia decided to abolish tuition fees. All you have to pay now is the social fees for your semester ticket. Currently, this costs 210 EUR per semester. This ticket also entitles you to use public transport free of charge throughout the region. Approx. 700 EUR per month should cover all your personal expenses, including mandatory health insurance.

The University Society "Westfälisch-Lippische Universitätsgesellschaft" awards some part-cost grants for international Master students.

Doing a doctorate (dissertation)

Students interested in an academic career after completing their master's degree may apply to join the Bielefeld Graduate School in History and Sociology (BGHS). This graduate school offers a well-structured, international, and multifaceted doctoral programme for post-graduates in History and Sociology. It is being funded by the German government's Initiative for Excellence. Currently, 160 doctoral candidates are doing research on topics drawn from the Faculty of Sociology and the Faculty of History, Philosophy and Theology.
