General information on the structure of the Master's programme in Sociology

(Bielefeld University)

- Standard period of study: 4 semesters
- the MA Sociology contains 120 credit points
- there are three compulsory modules, one profile area and three or four additional modules to be studied

¹ Typically, an elective module (14 credit points) consists of two classes: Seminar 1 + Seminar 2.

[&]quot;Studienleistungen" must be completed in both classes (4 credit points + 4 credit points) and "Prüfungsleistung" must be submitted in one seminar (6 credit points).

² Studienleistung: is an ungraded assignment that is usually completed during the semester. It is part of the self-study and attendance time and takes approximately 30 hours. The form in which the coursework is to be completed is usually determined by the lecturer in the first seminar session.

³ Prüfungsleistung: is a graded assignment that is usually completed at the end of the semester. It normally takes the form of a term paper (approx. 20 - 30 pages). However, other forms of assessment are also possible. The lecturer will provide information about the options at the beginning of the seminar.

Explanation: Profile

In the MA Sociology programme, you can choose between a **thematic profile** or a **general profile**.

(1) A **thematic profile** comprises **three modules of the same content/area** and three elective modules (including "student research project").

The student research project can be part of either any thematic profile or the other elective modules.

(Please note: Not all profile areas offer a sufficient number of courses in English!)

(2) The **general profile** comprises **Sociological Theory a** and **Sociological Methods a** and four elective modules (including "student research project")

(Please note: as soon as three elective modules of the same content are studied, it is a thematic profile and no longer a general profile!)

Due to the **maximum freedom of choice in the MA Sociology** study model, it is **not possible to create a general study plan for all students or even in advance.**

However, to give you a better understanding of the structure, you will find **an overview of exemplary and possible study templates below**. You can adapt the templates to your individual preferences.

Please note:

The templates do <u>NOT</u> reflect the temporal organisation of the modules, but general possibilities of the study structure.

The standard study period of the MA Sociology is 4 semesters, however individual circumstances must always be considered. **Please weigh up what is possible for you based on your situation.**⁴


⁴ To study in the standard period of study (4 semesters), 2 modules must be completed in each of the first 3 semesters. This means that two "Hausarbeiten" (term papers) must be written per semester, i.e. a total of 6.

After the first/second semester, it can be determined on an individual basis whether it is realistic to study in regular study time. <u>In any case, it is unrealistic to write more than two assignments and the Master's thesis in the third and fourth semesters.</u>

Explanation: Specialization

In the MA Sociology programme, you can choose between a specialization or no specialization.

- (1) A specialization always comprises two modules of the same content/area.
- (2) No specialization means that you study modules from different content/areas.


