The IGEL program has been published.

With the support of an interdisciplinary team that is endowed with practical experiences, the CPI of Bielefeld University has manualized the IGEL program and prepared it for school use.

The publisher Beltz Juventa has created the manual for teachers and provided additional teaching materials in a download area.

The manual is available for 24,95 Euro.

The IGEL program has been developed on behalf of the Federal Ministry of Education and Research (BMBF). It fulfills a crucial demand concerning effective school prevention following the rules of the Federal Government and the national round table "Sexual child abuse in dependency and within power relations in private and public sector institutions and within families".

The IGEL program follows a short and low-threshold strategy. The high efficacy, easy access and use, and a soft implementation are confirmed by an associated evaluation study.

Training courses of the IGEL program of about 300 minutes are offered to be provided at schools by the developers. Materials of the IGEL program are available as hardcopy and in an e-book format in the publisher's download area. The IGEL program can be used variably in an amount of 6 + 1 lessons at school.
